

## Meet Your Board Director



Mrs. Evelyn Dice was born in Franklin County, Pennsylvania, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Miles M. Funk who were engaged in farming most of their lives. Evelyn was married to Garnet Dice in 1938 and they have two sons. Mr. Dice farmed for 37 years and is now employed in the parts department of Stouffer Brothers, Inc., the local Case, Hesston, Gehl dealer.

Mrs. Dice graduated from Chambersburg High School. Shippensburg State College granted her a B.S. in Education with majors in History and Library Science; M.Ed in History and M.S.L.S. She was employed for six years at Penn Hall Junior College and Prep School as the Librarian. Penn Hall closed the spring of 1973 and she then worked in the library at Wilson College for one year. Hull Family," "The Ruckers," and "The Greater Love." The dedication service was held at 4:30 that afternoon.

Faith Church is only seven years old, having begun services on March 12, 1972 with Rev. Virgil E. Hull as the founding pastor. That first service, attended by eleven people, took place in the Daytona Beach City Hall, where they were to continue meeting until August, 1974. By May the attendance had reached 38, and in June they purchased a piano for \$725.

In August of 1974, the Southminster Presbyterian church offered an aluminum chapel for sale, and this was bought for \$6500. The building was dismantled and stored for over six months on a nearby farm, with all internal features being kept in a warehouse. Soon thereafter a \$1500 binder was placed on a three-acre piece of property in Port Orange.

Rev. Charles McKeown, the present pastor, was assigned to Faith church on February 7, 1975. Two months and one day later, the congregation was overjoyed to learn that a rezoning request had been granted. Land clearing was begun on April 21 and on July 20 the first service in the new building was held with 85 in attendance. The August 31 dedication, with Bishop George Weaver officiating, was attended by over 200 people from across the state.

Faith church continued to grow. In February of 1977, the church purchased a 15-passenger van to help in their work with senior citizens, and then a 38-passenger bus for the Sunday school. Finally, in the summer of 1977 the church board felt the need to build a larger building for worship.

Construction for the newly-dedicated structure was begun in April of 1978, with the men of the church doing most of the work. Services began in September, 1978, and the dedication, as already mentioned, took place on February 11.

Annual Conference Held. The 11th session of the Florida Annual Conference met February 9-10 at the Faith U.B. Church, Port Orange, Florida. The conference was chaired by Bishop Raymond Waldfogel with Superintendent Chester Hirschy serving as assistant chairman. Rev. R. Charles McKeown was the host pastor. Eighteen ministers and lay delegates answered the roll representing four organized churches and three church extension projects.

Rev. Devon Strine was received into the conference on transfer from North Oh. Conference, and Rev. Calvin Sturdy was tentatively received pending his transfer from the Ontario Conference. The conference dropped the name of Pierre Samaan from the roll of ministers.

Rev. W. W. Bowditch was elected conference

superintendent and Mrs. Ralph Fry was elected treasurer.

In the evening service Bishop Waldfogel brought a stirring message to the conference. Arnold B. Blakely and Vesta Thompson were received into the Annual Conference and George W. Kuntzman was ordained an elder.

The conference continued on Saturday with 21 members present. The Stationing Committee presented the following report:
